Terror Wars-Culture Wars: Race, Popular Culture and the Civil Rights Legacy After 9/11: This monograph considers the contours of popular culture and contemporary political discourse in the wake of the 9/11 attacks. Spanning the 2000s, I look at how Black people, racism, and the Civil Rights legacy have been reshaped and recruited for the War on Terror. In doing so, I look at film, tv, and political discourse. In each chapter, I historicize the text or event I am considering by drawing upon central events in the 1960s and 1970s. For example, a chapter on the NYPD's surveillance of Muslims shows how the groundwork for that operation was laid in the NYPD/COINTELPRO surveillance of New York's Black Panther Party. Racial formations, particularly those of Black, white, and Muslim peoples, transformed during this period, fueled by popular culture, political rhetoric and the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq. This book is under contract at Duke University Press.
