## **PUBLIC POLICY BACKGROUND**

### **Director of Advocacy (Inaugural Director), Miriam’s Kitchen, Washington, D.C.**

Key Accomplishments: Developed the public policy and advocacy agenda, which advanced Miriam’s Kitchen’s core objectives and goals for ending homelessness in the nation’s capital. Promoted client-led advocacy efforts and partnered with the client-led advocacy group in ways that built the skill set and capacity of its membership and advanced its policy agenda. Increased the organization’s presence in D.C. policy-making environments through testimony at city



council hearings, meetings with policymakers and other local government officials, and active leadership in policy working groups and city-wide coalitions.

**Chair, Fair Budget Coalition, Washington, D.C.**

Key Accomplishments: Led a coalition of approximately 75-member organizations in advancing the cause of a just and inclusive District of Columbia through public policy advocacy and community mobilization. Guided the coalition’s steering committee in a 5-year strategic planning process, which included an organizational restructure, for the purpose of redefining its goals and strategic objectives. Developed a direct-action campaign strategy geared toward increasing funding to critical safety net programs, which resulted in major funding allocations by the D.C. Council’s budget for important human service programs.
